Mr. Harrington welcomed everyone to the meeting and said this evening we will highlight some incredible accomplishments for some of our students and staff. He welcomed back our student representatives and said that this time of year is usually quiet but not here in Bellmore-Merrick. We have had so many wonderful events such as, robotics competitions, MLK Day of Service and Holocaust Remembrance Day. He thanked the Board of Education for their continued support of our programs and staff and he congratulated everyone that is receiving an Award of Honor certificate tonight. Mr. Harrington thanked our teachers, coaches and staff for all that they do for our students.

A. Award of Honor Presentation - Regeneron Scholars

Mr. Harrington congratulated the Regeneron Scholars on their achievement, their parents and their teachers. He said that these students started their research during the COVID-19 pandemic and this journey has left them with an amazing skill set.

Dr Kaplan presented an Award of Honor certificate to Clair Schwarz and said "Claire Schwartz, a senior in the Advanced Science Research program at Kennedy High School, is a young woman of great character who is highly respected and uniquely motivated within a wide array of commitments. A student-athlete who balances an extraordinary workload and serves as a leader among her peers, Claire is tirelessly invested in enhancing her school community. Claire has fully immersed herself within her research, entitled The Administration of Sulforaphane via Broccoli Sprouts Ameliorates Parkinson's Disease Phenotypes in a Drosophila melanogaster Model. She investigated the effect of sulforaphane on Parkinson's disease and hopes to apply the perspective she has acquired and enhance her base of knowledge as an undergraduate Biology major on her way to a career in the medical field. A trusted leader and coordinator, Claire has made an impression as an integral member of Kennedy's School and Community Leadership program. A three-sport varsity athlete, Claire has dedicated herself and prioritized team commitments throughout each school year. She serves as the Recycling Manager within our HOPE club, and embraces assisting and mentoring others as a Peer Tutor within Tutors for a Cure and as part of our ACES (Athletes Compassionately Educating Students) program.

Manager. Amidst a wide array of time-consuming commitments, Claire remains supremely motivated, inquisitive, industrious and uniquely composed. Claire has been inducted into six different honor societies, as she has distinguished herself in every subject area. Congratulations Claire!"

Ms. Piskin presented Cole Wasserman with an Award of Honor certificate and said "Cole Wasserman, a focused, altruistic and accomplished senior in the Advanced Science Research Program at Kennedy High School, embraces scholarship, research, service and initiative. Cole's inclination to help others motivates him to prioritize using his science endeavors to assist those with special needs. Science remains a central focus amidst Cole's uniquely demanding academic program. Within our Advanced Science Research Program, this class of 2024 Salutatorian investigated APCMediated Expansion of hPSC-Derived Natural Killer Cells. His research concerned the viability of a novel new cancer treatment using natural killer cells derived from stem cells. Cole has dedicated hundreds of hours to his current research at Icahn School of Medicine at Mount Sinai. Cole eagerly looks forward to majoring in Biochemistry and Molecular Biology at Brown University, and he plans to make research a primary focus as an undergraduate and throughout medical school. In our school community, Cole proudly serves as Co-President of our Math Team. He continues to earn recognition within competitions as a member of our Science Club, where he serves as a Team Leader, and our Science Olympiad team. Cole was a lead builder for the REACH Challenge team that received first place nationally for their development of an adaptive desk developed for a special needs student. He also serves as Treasurer of our Tutors for a Cure program. Beyond our settings, Cole is presently working with The Nassau County United Cerebral Palsy Foundation to repair and refurbish aging adaptive toys and devices that their students rely upon. Ms. Ryan presented Christiana Foufas with an Award of Honor certificate and said "Christiana Foufas is a brilliant and compassionate student. Her academic accolades are endless: Valedictorian for the Class of 2024, National Merit Commended Student, AP Capstone Diploma and Seal of Biliteracy recipient, AP Scholar with Distinction, score of 5 on every Advanced Placement exam taken, and a member of five academic honor societies. In the classroom, she is a team player and true cheerleader for her peers. Christiana has also enrolled in our two most rigorous research programs: AP Research and Advanced Science Research. Her AP Capstone Research study examined the financial knowledge of high school students on Long Island. This research was highlighted on the National Financial Educators Council's website. Through the Advanced Science Research program, Christiana has worked with Dr. Eric Lamberg of Stony Brook University and Head Coach of the US National Amputee Soccer Team researching players' perceptions of adaptive sports on their recovery. Christiana received honors at the Long Island Science competition for this research. It also inspired her to start her own non-profit called Enable Athletics, which promotes adaptive sports. As a senior, Christiana is working with Dr. Meir Barak researching the structure-function relationship in rabbit talus. She is also the lead mentor for Grand Avenue Middle School's Students' Network of Cooperative Science. Christiana is actively involved as a Girl Scout, is an athlete who participates in both the basketball and served as captain of the track and field team, has been Vice-President of her class for the last four years, Vice President of Build-On and also an active member of several other clubs and organizations. Christiana also has the distinct honor of being named the 2023 Miss Laconia, Greece for the Federation of Hellenic Societies of Greater New York. Christiana intends to pursue a degree in Biochemistry. We look forward to celebrating her continued success this year and after graduation. Congratulations Christiana!"

Ms. Cmar-Grote presented an Award of Honor certificate to Molly Graff and said "Molly Graff is an extraordinary individual who has earned induction to five academic honor societies. Molly also used the summer of her junior year to attend a summer program at Oxford University; while there, she conducted original research in the field of clinical psychology. The abstract of this research was published in the Oxford Summer Journal of Psychology. It comes as no surprise that Molly plans to continue her passion for research in college by majoring in neuroscience, psychology, or cognitive science. Molly immerses herself completely and fully to all of her endeavors both academic and extra-curricular. She has become an integral part of the school community and is an active member of the Model UN, Peer Tutors, and the Robotics Club. Congratulations Molly!"

Mr. Corona presented an Award of Honor Certificate to the Calhoun Football team and said "Calhoun High School's football team was one of two programs to win the New York State Public High School Athletic Association Fall 2023 Community Service Challenge. The team spent their season evolving into community advocates for cardiac screenings for young people. The team hosted "Cardiac Screening" themed games and set up booths at community events to educate and raise awareness for the importance of cardiac screenings while fundraising for St. Francis Hospital's Cardiac Screening Programs. It was important to the team to raise awareness about early screenings to detect abnormalities since many are asymptomatic. "I am extremely proud of our players, parents and school community in our attempt to bring attention to sudden cardiac death awareness," said head coach Nick Rawls. "As a program we wanted to highlight a cause that is unfortunately overlooked but is extremely important to bring attention to. Our players dedicated their time, energy, and effort to reach out to the community during games as well as at the Merrick Fair in order to help bring awareness and raise money for a worthy cause. They represented Calhoun with dignity and class and had a profound impact on those who they interacted with." Congratulations!"

<u>D. Award of Honor Presentation - National Wrestling Hall of Fame Inductees</u> Coach Brian DeGaetano - Kennedy High School Coach Peter Barros - Kennedy High School

Mr. Harrington congratulated Coach DeGaetano and Coach Barros for their hard work and the positive impact they have had on our students and community.

Ms. Goller presented an Award of Honor certificate to Coach Peter Barros and said "Coach Barros has been involved with the sport of wrestling as a wrestler, official, and coach for 59 consecutive years. Coach Barros wrestled at C.W. Post and Springfield College in Massachusetts. Upon graduation from Springfield, he was hired as an elementary school physical education teacher in the Half Hollow Hills School District where he began his coaching career at Harborfields High School. In 1982, Coach Barros began teaching physical education at Half Hollow Hills West High School and became an assistant wrestling coach; several years later, he became the Head Varsity Wrestling Coach at Walt Whitman High School. After leaving Whitman, Coach Barros became a wresting official, but after a few years got back to coaching on the mat as an assistant at Syosset High School working with Mike Murtha, a former college All-American wrestler. Lucky for us, Coach Barros decided to come to Kennedy where he has served as an assistant for the past five years. Coach Barros has had a tremendous career and has influenced thousands of student-athletes as a coach and mentor in the sport. Congratulations Coach Barros!"

Ms. Goller presented an Award of Honor certificate to Coach Brian DeGaetano and said "Now entering his 30th season at Kennedy High School and 33rd year coaching wrestling in Nassau County, Coach DeGaetano has led the Cougars to a 374-136-3 Dual-Meet record. He is the longest tenured head coach in Bellmore-Merrick history and the longest reigning coach at one school in Nassau County. Under his leadership, the Cougars have won 31 Invitational Championships, 16 League and Qualifying Tournament Championships, have made the Dual-Meet Championships every season including seven Top Eight, three Final Four finishes and County Final appearances in 2007. The Cougars finished in the top ten of the Section 8 tournament 11 times and top 20 thirteen times. Under Coach DeGaetano, 344 wrestlers have earned All-Conference honors, 83 have won conference championships, 84 earned All-County including six County champions and 16 runners-up. Fourteen wrestlers have qualified for the State championships with six wrestlers earning All-State honors. Eighty-seven wrestlers have won invitational championships, including four NYS freestyle/Greco Roman championships. For his efforts, Brian is a nine-time Conference Coach of the Year recipient and in 2022 received the LIWOA Sportsmanship Award. However, what coach is most proud of is the Alumni Club which he helped establish in 1996. What started out as a way to fundraise for the team has turned into so much more. Over 500 former wrestlers are connected with the team, and it has kept the Cougar wrestling family strong. Coach DeGaetano cites coach John Thomas, John Schaefer and George Munnich as tremendous influences in his success as a wrestling coach. Congratulations Coach DeGaetano!"

Mr. DeGaetano has been the coach at Kennedy for over 30 years and has built one of the county's most distinguished programs. He will be inducted in a ceremony on April 13. Kennedy students had the privilege of hearing from two Holocaust survivors on January 30. The speakers spoke to students about their experiences their homes during the early 1930s and the impact the genocide had on their families. The next day, students in the Leadership program heard from Mr. Carl Wilkens, the only American to remain in Rwanda during the genocide there. That story was equally impactful and highlighted the way that Rwandans restored peace after the travesty in that country. The Kennedy Science Department has been busy. Two ASR students were named semifinalists in the prestigious Regeneron Science Talent Search, the Robotics teams hosted the VEX Robotics tournament where over 40 teams from around Long Island competed, and three of the six Kennedy teams finished in the Top 15. Also, the Kennedy Science Olympiad team competed in the regional competition this weekend. The team received 16 medals. AND Kennnedy's International Technology and Engineering Educators REACH teams have been named national semifinalists and finalists. Finally, we ended January with a bang with our annual Jam the Gym events. This annual Student Government event is a highlight of the year, and I can tell you we literally JAMMED THE GYM. Both nights were highlighted by competitive basketball games and the very best of the Cougar Nation spirit. The student government gave away free t-shirts and rally towels, we hosted halftime
