4. Superintendent's Report

Mr. Harrington congratulated the Calhoun Girls Track on winning the Nassau County Championship. He said their grit and perseverance will stay with them forever and the memory of winning the championships with their friends will never be forgotten.

A. Award of Honor Presentation - Calhoun Girls Track Nassau County Champions

Mr. Corona presented each member of the team with an Award of Honor certificate and said "The Calhoun Girls Track & Field team clinched the Nassau County championship on February 6th. It was a great team effort, with many girls running their personal bests. During the past six years, Calhoun's bread and butter has been the jumps and this year was no different. Sophia Hines, Yolina Bastien, and Danielle Lawrence each performed outstanding with Sophia becoming a two-event County Champion in the long and triple jump. Yolina earned third in long jump and second in the triple jump while Danielle finished fourth in long jump and third in triple jump. They are the heart and soul of this team and will go down as some of the best to ever compete not only at Calhoun, but also in Long Island and New York State. The 4x800 team would lead the team to an All-County finish and the 4x400 team would shock the meet taking fourth overall and knocking the opponents out of scoring position. Dana Wauchope, in her first winter season, threw a school record and personal best to take second in weight throw, breaking up Valley Steam North in an event they should have dominated. "The girls entered the season with a goal and had a drive and determination like no other," said Coach Migliano. "The girls demonstrated why track is a TEAM sport and picked each other up the entire night. We are more than a team and more than a program; we are a family. 4. Superintendent's Report

Mr. Harrington welcomed everyone to the meeting and said he hopes that all those who celebrated had a Happy Easter and wished everyone celebrating a Happy Eid-Al-Fitr and Happy Passover. He mentioned that earlier in the evening we honored the Calhoun Girls Track team for winning the Nassau County Championship and Logan Schaeffler for winning the NYS Championship. He said tonight we welcome back our student representatives and said it was a very busy month with events like Honor Society Inductions, St. Baldrick and the Youth Summit. He said spring sports are off to a great start and all of our musicals were outstanding. Mr. Harrington congratulated Ms. Fontana and our Music Department for receiving the Best Community for Music award.

B. Award of Honor Presentation - Knighting of David Goldberg

Ms. Goller presented an Award of Honor certificate to David Goldberg and said "Mr. David Goldberg of Calhoun High School was recently "knighted" by an 800-year-old knighthood organization based in Florence, Italy that recognized him for his public service. He teaches both social studies and Voices of the Past and is very active in social causes beyond teaching. He sits on the board of many organizations who are dedicated to promoting sustainable development and renewable energy. Mr. Goldberg was recognized by Parte Guelfa, a knighthood

C. Curriculum, Instruction and Data Presentation - ENL

Mr. Montes, Ms. Cabrera, Ms. Glick, Ms. Ram and Ms. Schlieth gave a presentation to the audience about the District's English as a New Language Program (ENL). The district's ENL program currently has 63 English Language Learners (ELL). They explained the additional challenges ELL students have such as language development, time management skills, family separation and homesickness. They explained the goals of the program, such as acquiring as much English as possible, working towards graduation and giving guidance beyond high school. Two students, Gianluca Arrieta and Allison Hernandez gave presentations to the audience and explained how the ENL program helped them adapt to school life in the Unites States and how the teachers are so wonderful that they become more like family.

D. Student Representatives

Sydney Brewer from Kennedy High School said :ood evening! It is so great to see you all again! I am thrilled with our school's accomplishments as we enter the final quarter of the 2023-2024 school year. To end off February, we had Class Night on February 29. Each class participated by contributing to games such as Hungry Hungry Hippo, tug of war, and even table surfing! Leading up to the class night, we hosted Penny Wars. Penny Wars is when you try to put as many pennies in a jar for your class as possible, and you put dollars and silver coins in the other grades' jars to get their points taken away. The way it is, each penny counts for 1 point, but if you put in a nickel, it's -5, a dollar -100, etc. This is a fun and competitive way to raise money for our Ear to Ear Initiative, which promotes mental health. E. Budget Presentation

Mikaela Coni, Assistant Superintendent for Business thanked the Board of Education for always supporting our goals and missions. She gave a presentation on the proposed 2024/2025 school budget of \$197,450,603 and explained that the 2024/2025 budget meets all of our budget goals, is fiscally responsible focuses on sustainability in the future. The 2024/2025 budget will have a 4.55% budget increase from the current school year. The tax levy increase of 2.55% is keeping under the tax cap for the 13th consecutive year. She explained some of the budget drivers, such as health insurance increases, unallocated insurance, facilities, transportation, Special Education, Technology and Curriculum & Instruction.

Mr. Bersin explained some of the Curriculum and Instruction goals of the budget which include enhancing learning levels and ensuring our students are ready for career and college. He said we are keeping up with the digital age and developing STEAM 9 Research to help our ninth grade students build opportunities that help their future. Mr. Bersin said research, writing and presentation skills are a main focus for our students and our specialty programs are over subscribed for next year. We are currently developing a new pathway for our students called Pre-Education & Human Services to provide students with coursework relevant to working in careers in education and human services. Mr. Bersin said with regard to wellness and social-emotional learning, we will continue the Middle School Advisory Program and will also continue to do as much as possible to teach inclusion and belonging.

Ms. Coni said the Grand Avenue Middle School capital projects were completed in the fall and the next project will be at Merrick Avenue Middle school this summer. The project will include parking lot renovations and reconfiguring for better traffic slow and safety. She said that the 2024/2025 ballot will have three propositions. The first proposition will be for the school budget, the second proposition is to expend capital reserve which will have no impact on the taxpayers. The third proposition is to establish a new capital reserve fund which will allow us to continue to fund projects since we have reached the cap on the current fund.

Ms. Coni mentioned that the Public Budget Hearing will take place on May 8, 2024 and the budget vote will take place on May 21, 2024. She said that all of the budget information is available on our website and said that if anyone has questions, please contact her.

Ms. Goller thanked Ms. Coni for the incredible presentation. She also thanked Mr. Harrington and the administration for their dedicated efforts in assembling the budget. Ms. Goller is proud of the exciting opportunities being offered to our students.

A. Guidelines to Public Comments

The Board of Education encourages public participation on school related matters at Board meetings. To allow for public participation, a period not to exceed 30 minutes shall be set aside during each Board meeting. Any person wishing to make comments or raise questions shall complete an information card. Questions are to be addressed to the Board President, not to individual board members. Personal attacks on individual board members, administrators and staff will not be tolerated and may be cause to adjourn the meeting. There will be no back and forth dialogue. Out of courtesy and fairness to the rest of the audience, it would be appreciated if each visitor would limit his/her remarks to not more than three minutes or ask only one question. Public discussion on matters relating to staff and students, by which their reputation, privacy, or rights to due process, or those of others could be in some way violated, is prohibited.

Ms. Goller accepted the following non-agenda comment during the first public comment period:

Nattie M. is a student and she discussed Autism Acceptance and asked the Board of Education to look at how our schools recognize Autism. She would like to see the district use of the new infinity symbol and move away from using the puzzle piece. She explained the origin of the puzzle piece which puts the emphasis on autistic people as being a puzzle, mystery or something that needs to be solved. She also discussed the importance of using the language of Autism Acceptance which should be the goal of our schools. She said to have acceptance shows true understanding and compassion, awareness is not enough. She urged the Board of Education to continue being on the forefront and make these changes.

Mr. Harrington said that her comment was incredible and we are very proud of her. He assured her that we will work closely with Ms. Paluseo and our building principals to make changes.

improvements/renovation/upgrades, including the installation of solar power, improvements/ renovations/upgrades, fuel tank replacement, renovations required for compliance with ADA requirements, vocational and career preparation renovations, portable classroom replacement and/or purchase, roof/gutter/leader replacement, window replacement, structural renovations including masonry, brick and steel replacement, paving and concrete replacement, interior and exterior door/entry ways replacement (including hardware), toilet room renovations, lighting upgrades, ceiling replacement, floor replacement, wall replacement, boiler replacements, elevators, carpentry renovations, purchase of buildings/land, site renovations/reconstruction including track resurfacing and turf field replacement, press box/dugout/ field house improvements/renovations/ upgrades, bleacher improvements/renovations/upgrades, upgrades of signs, athletic field renovations/reconstruction, tennis court renovations, playground renovations, lockers/locker room renovations, public address/clock system replacement, sound system upgrades, telephone system upgrades, hazardous material remediation, storage space renovations, furnishings and equipment, including the purchase of vehicles.

The maximum amount of the aforesaid Capital Reserve Fund shall be \$10,000,000, plus investment income. The probable term is to be twelve (12) years. The funds are to be transferred from surplus monies remaining in the general fund, capital fund, and/or in other reserves not to exceed \$4,500,000 from the 2023-2024 budget and thereafter in an annual amount of not more the \$4,500,000 for each remaining year of the term. The Superintendent of Schools or his designee is hereby directed to deposit monies of this reserve fund in a separate bank account to be known as the "Facilities Improvement Program 2024."
